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## THE VILLAGE OF COSBY CELEBRATES EARTH DAY



An Earth Day celebration was held at the Village of Cosby's new wastewater treatment site on April 22, 2009. USDA Rural Development is providing funding which consists of \$400,000 in loans and \$718,400 in grants. In addition, the Department of Natural Resources provided a loan in the amount of \$100,000 and a grant in the amount of \$82,600 and Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) provided funds in the amount of a \$295,000 grant for the project. The combined funds are being used to construct

a new central wastewater collection and treatment system to serve Cosby's 55 residents. These improvements should contribute to a safer and healthier environment for the citizens as well as make the community more attractive to homeowners and potential businesses.

The funds are being provided through USDA Rural Development's Water and Environmental program. This program provides loans, grants and loan guarantees for drinking water, sanitary sewer, solid waste and storm drainage facilities in rural areas and cities and towns of 10,000 or less.

"Celebrating Earth Day is a time to stop and think about how important it is to take good care of our planet," U.S. Senator Claire McCaskill said. "It's important to protect our water sources while also making sure that Missourians have access to clean, safe water, and this project plays a role in that effort."
